




Certified Local Government Program

 3,678 buildings, structures and objects designated as Recorded Texas Historic Landmarks (RTHLs) from 1962 to






Texas Historical Commission Project Review

- 15,000: Average number of projects reviewed per year by Texas Historical Commission review staff
- 96%: Projects reviewed in 2012 that had no effect or no adverse effect on historic properties, compared with those with an adverse effect






Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program

- 235 Historic county courthouses
- State taxes generated:\$22,037,507
- 63 counties have received full funding for courthouse renovations
- 9,693 jobs created
- \$269,310,968 in income generated



Economic Benefits


- Federal rehabilitation tax credit projects in Texas (1979 to 2011):
 - 500+ projects
 - Jobs created: 31,694
 - State and local tax revenue generated: \$140,000+
 - Total reinvested in the Texas economy: \$1.3 billion
 - Total amount spent FY 2012:\$36 million
 - Average project amount since
 2000: \$6 million




Mid-century Modern Architecture

 1949-1957










In The News

Conservation Districts

- Dallas has one of the country's most established programs
- Begun in 1988
- 20 conservation districts
- "Each CD is tailor-made to the neighborhood and what it collectively wants to preserve."
- Primarily single-family residential, but some commercial










Stepping Down Even Further: Neighborhood Stabilization Overlay

- Adopted 2005
- Faster, simpler alternative to historic designation and conservation districts
 - Front yard setback
 - Side yard setback
 - Garage location, placement and connection
 - Height
